North Wales Chronicle 7 Dec 1872 - Dolgelly

The Horse Case – Reese v. Owen. This was an action brought by the plaintiff, Wm. Reese, of the Barmouth Hotel, Barmouth, against Griffith Charles Owen, of this town, hairdresser, for the value of a horse detained by the defendant, and also for the detention thereof, the total amount claimed by the plaintiff being £6. Mr Griffith J. Williams appeared for the plaintiff, and Mr W. R. Davies for defendant. The gist of the case was that the plaintiff bought a pony from a man named Thompson for £5, which the defendant took possession of alleging it to have been stolen from him. After the plaintiff had been examined and subjected to a stringent cross-examination, his Honour suggested that the case should be adjourned to next court, to give an opportunity of paying £1 to Thompson and £5 to plaintiff. This was agreed upon by the advocates on either sides, and the case was adjourned to give the parties an opportunity to come to some such settlement.

Freeman's Journal and Daily Commercial Advertiser 14 Jul 1875 – Fatal Carriage Accident

Bangor, Tuesday Night. While Mr Rees, Barmouth Hotel, Barmouth, Mrs Rees, and a gentleman friend staying with them, were yesterday driving home in a break, drawn by two horses, the animals, in descending the hill Llanfair-juxta-Harlech, became scared, and started off at a tearing gallop. At a sudden turn of the road the carriage struck against a wall and was shivered to atoms. The occupants were so seriously injured that Mr Rees expired within a few hours, and Mrs Rees and the gentleman are so ill that it is feared they may also succumb.

Liverpool Mercury 14 Jul 1875

Two persons were killed and three injured by a carriage accident near Harlech, on Sunday-night. Mr and Mrs Rees, of the Barmouth Hotel, Barmouth, were the unfortunate victims.

North Wales Chronicle 17 Jul 1875 – Fatal Carriage Accident near Harlech

A most melancholy and fatal accident occurred in the neighbourhood of Pensarn on Sunday last. On that day Mr William Rees, his wife, and Edward Lewis, John Lewis, and Frank Lewis, shepherds, went for a drive in a direction of Harlech. On their return home, they gave a lift to a strange woman and child. When the carriage arrived in the neighbourhood, one of the horses took head. This particular road, under any circumstances, is a most dangerous one, and requires great caution on the driver's part. In the direction in which the horse ran away the road is all down a hill, and has some very dangerous turns. Of course, all command was lost over the horses, which ran at full speed down the road. Frank Lewis, who was sitting on the box, jumped off, and by doing so escaped injury. In rounding a narrow turn on the road the vehicle came in contact with the wall, pitching all its occupants out. The horses continued their course some short distance further. It was a sad sight to see those whom a short time previous had been enjoying themselves in health and strength, now lying insensible on the roadway. The first person to arrive on the scene was Mr Richard Gough, station-master at Pensarn. He was about 30 or 40 yards from the place where the accident occurred. He at once sent for assistance, which speedily arrived. Stimulants were supplied to the sufferers, and all were removed to the Crown Inn, Llanfair. All were then alive. Mr Rees spoke before his death, which occurred about three hours after the accident. It was between seven and eight o'clock in the evening when the accident occurred. Edward Lewis, who was considerably hurt, is now getting on well. John Lewis, aged 12 years has had his arm dislocated, but is doing well. Mrs Rees, up to the time of writing was not dead, but was very ill. It was hoped she would recover, and up to the time of writing had improved. In the next room to where she lay was the body of her husband confined up. It was conveyed to Barmouth on the evening of the 13th. A deep gloom has been cast over the district by this sad accident. Mr and Mrs Rees were greatly liked and respected. The former was the proprietor of the Barmouth hotel for many years, and his numerous friends and acquaintances will deeply regret his sad and untimely death. An inquest was held on the following day (Monday), when the above facts were given in evidence and a verdict of Accidental Death was returned. The coroner was Mr Griffith Jones Williams.
