Wellington Pioneer Roll – people who arrived up to 1855 and those born in the province up to 1865
Isaiah Crowther and two daughters

New Zealand Gazette and Wellington Spectator 27 Oct 1841 Court of Requests
Alfred Hornbrook v. Isaiah Crowther £8 6s; A. Hort jun v. Isaiah Crowther £8 17s; A. Hort jun v. Robert Cummins £32 5s; Timothy O'Meara v. William Goodfellow £5 10s. In these four cases, the defendant Cummins is the master of the 'Sally Anne', and the others going from Port Nicholson to Auckland. Process was served upon the several parties as they were about to leave the harbour. The defendants were called, but did not answer. Judgements were entered up against them, and execution will follow to the Thames, or wherever the parties may happen to be.

Daily Southern Cross 12 Feb 1848 Supreme Court In Banco Reginae Monday, February 7, 1848
A case of unusual interest was brought before His Honor the Chief Justice on Monday last; and the Court was well filled with a respectable audience, amongst whom we noticed many of the influential merchants and leading men of the settlement...on or about the 6th day of January last, deponent, as agent for Robert Graham and David Graham, of Auckland aforesaid, merchants and copartners, applied to William Tye, Clerk of the Court of Requests, for a summons at the suit of the said R. Graham and D. Graham, against one Isaiah Crowther, of Auckland, tailor, for the recovery of the sum of £4 10s., balance of an account for goods sold and delivered...

Notice of Removal. I. Crowther begs to inform the inhabitants of Auckland generally, that he has removed from Parnell to Eden Crescent, Auckland, - where he intends to furnish the very best articles in every branch of the above line of business, for the lowest possible remunerative prices for Cash. Also at the same establishment Misses A. & M. Crowther beg to inform the ladies of Auckland, that they have commenced the Business of Straw Bonnet and Dressmaking; where, by an assiduous attention to business and taste, they trust to give every satisfaction to those Ladies who may favor them with their orders. June 18, 1850.

Daily Southern Cross Supreme Court Saturday 4 Mar 1851

John McGregor was indicted for stealing two coats and one pair of trousers, the property of Isaiah Crowther. The property had been stolen from the counter in the shop of the prosecutor, on the 5th of October last, and was found by the police, in consequence of information received by them, in the possession of the prisoner, at his lodgings.

New Zealander 5 Mar 1851

John McGregor was charged with having stolen from Isaiah Crowther, on the 5th October last, two paper parcels containing a black frock coat, a tweed coat, two pairs trousers, and one white waistcoat. From the evidence it appeared that these articles were stolen from Mr Crowther's shop in Official Bay, on the evening of Saturday the 5th October last; that on the 7th December following a pair of tweed trousers and tweed coat were brought to him by a pensioner named John Finney, who stated the articles had been given to him by McGregor, who resided in his house. The other articles were found in the possession of the prisoner McGregor, in a house occupied by him and Finney's wife, who had left her husband to reside with the prisoner on Chapel Hill. The clothes were clearly identified by Mr Crowther, and the prisoner was found Guilty...

New Zealander 8 Mar 1851 Supreme Court Wednesday 5 Mar 1851

John McGregor – stealing two coats, two pairs trousers, and a waistcoat from Isaiah Crowther – to be transported for seven years; and for stealing a silver watch from William Bacon – transported for seven years, to be computed from the termination of the former sentence.
