Evening Post 18 Sep 1891 Death

On the 17th September, at the residence of her brother-in-law, Mr Wm. Jones, Lower Hutt, Louisa Broderick, third daughter of the late C. Broderick, of Ohariu, aged 48 years.

Evening Post 18 January 1896 Death and Obituary

On the 17th January, at Otaki, William Jones, late Hutt County Clerk; aged 72 years.

A familiar figure in the city up till the early part of 1893 was that of Mr William Jones, for many years clerk to the Hutt County Council, and the announcement in our obituary column to-day of his death, at the age of 72, will be read with regret. The deceased had an interesting history. Born at Halesowen, near Birmingham, in January 1824, when 14 years of age a commission in the Naval service in the East Indies was arranged for him, but owing to ill-health he was unable to take it up. Later on he went into the iron trade, ultimately becoming secretary and manager for a large iron company near Birmingham. The independent character of colonial life attracted him, like many others, and in June, 1858, he came to this colony in the ship 'Amboozine', and on arrival went to Rangitikei as manager of Mr A. de B. Brandon's run near Marton. Subsequently, in conjunction with Mr C. J. Harrison, he bought the station, and settled down to sheep and cattle-farming till May, 1864, when he came to Wellington, and entered the service of the Provincial Government, being employed both in the Deeds and Lands Offices. On the abolition of Provincial Government and the formation of counties, he became Clerk to the Hutt County Council, which position he filled with every credit to himself and to the County Council until March 1893 when he retired, and went to live with his sons at Otaki, at which place he died yesterday from failure of the heart's action. He was in fairly good health up to within a few hours of his death. He was married in 1831 [sic] to a daughter of the late Mr C. Broderick, of Ohariu, who survives him with a family of five – three sons and two daughters. He is to be buried at 3 o'clock to-morrow afternoon.

Evening Post 19 Oct 1901 Death

On the 18th October, at Otaki, Ernest Broderick, third son of the late William Jones, Lower Hutt, aged 34 years. The funeral will leave Te Manno, Otaki, for Mission Cemetery on Sunday at 2 p.m.

Evening Post 26 Oct 1909 Death

On the 25th October, at her residence, Wairenga-road, Otaki, Emma, the relict of the late William Jones, aged 77 years. Funeral on Wednesday at 2 p.m.

Manawatu Standard 29 Oct 1909 Personal

Mrs Wm Jones, a well-known resident of Otaki, died on Monday, aged 78. The late Mrs Jones came with her parents, Mr and Mrs C. Broderick, to New Zealand in 1843, landing in Wellington. Her parents settled on the land at Porirua, and here deceased resided, with the exception of two short periods spent at Sydney, until the year 1861, when she married Mr William Jones. She and her husband went to reside at Patiki-papa, near Marton, in the Rangitikei district, and afterwards they returned to Wellington, where the late Mr Jones entered the Government service. They

afterwards resided at Tawa Flat and Lower Hutt, Mr Jones acting as clerk of the Hutt County Council for seventeen years. After retiring from this position, Mr Jones and wife came to Otaki to reside, some 18 years ago. Mr Jones died in 1896, and his widow continued to reside there until her death.

Evening Post 8 Jul 1915 Civil Business

In the case of Frederick Charles Jones and Herbert Oldbury Jones v. Wm. Parker, judgement was given for plaintiff for £14 10s, with £2 6s costs, and possession on or before the 23rd instant.
