And when? For as this may fairly be considered the port of embarcation for the Halifax and other northern districts, the conditions of the Company have been amply complied with. We are at liberty now to engage immigrants for free embarcation? And in case of no vessel being put on the berth here, would the Company bear the expense of joining to London? Certainly the laborers from these parts would not, but would rather emigrate to another destination. Should a man and his wife (aged from 40 to 45 years) agree to take out with them a family of 4 or 6 children, would a free passage be granted to them under such circumstances, although somewhat older than the usual requirement? We have had such an application from a very deserving party, and the children would not go without their parents – besides through their medium we believe that many others would be induced to follow – this family would take out some little money with them. Several individuals whom we know up the country are waiting our answer to their applications and hence we... yours. Could a poor man in any way buy land through the Company to the value of £50 or £100 now that the list is closed, as £300 is beyond their individual means generally? Herewith we send four letters received by us only yesterday and having opened the one from Mr James Hallpike.. "Dalston near Hackney" and not being able to understand the contents, we refer the matter to you for reply.
