Principal Agent's papers

When the news of the surrender by the New Zealand Company of its charter reached the colony, negotiations were initiated by the local government to make available all records relating to land in the Principal Agent's office. On 27 January 1851, Domett, Colonial Secretary of New Munster, wrote to Fox, Principal Agent of the New Zealand Company, stating that he had been directed by the Governor-in-Chief to state that, because of the heavy loss which must be entailed upon the entire colony should the government not possess information relating to land tenure, etc. without delay, he trusted that Fox would hand over to persons appointed by the government the various plans, documents and records in the New Zealand Company's offices. Fox replied to this communication the next day stating that he was willing to allow persons nominated by himself to compile a schedule from the records in his possession containing sufficient information to permit the local government to administer the lands which became vested in it since the Company surrendered its charter. He stated that everything was to remain in the Company's office, and subject to its control until instructions were received by him from England, and he pointed out that the arrangement might have to be terminated on receipt of instructions which might render it improper for the government to have access to the records. Domett replied on 30 January that the government could not make itself a party to such an arrangement, and further stated on 5 February that the government could not hold itself liable for injury caused by the New Zealand Company not furnishing the required information. This correspondence was forwarded by Grey in despatch 36 dated 08 February 1851¹ to Earl Grey in which he stated that the Government could never venture to issue Crown Grants under the terms proposed by Fox's letter to Domett of 28 January, that the position was most unsatisfactory and that some arrangement should be made as soon as possible. In the meantime he awaited instructions from England. Grey further stated that he was convinced that Fox was influenced by a desire to embarrass the government. On 11 February Fox left for England taking with him a box containing records of the Principal Agent's office (see list A appended).

However on 14 March 1851, Kelham, Acting Principal Agent, wrote to Harington stating that although he would decline to place the New Zealand Company's property unreservedly at the government's disposal, he would give free access to the government's officers to investigate all documents, and give every assistance so that no unreasonable impediment might be thrown in the government's way to grant titles. Mr Lewis had been engaged by him to arrange papers and correspondence and place them in boxes lest the labour of years be jeopardised for want of a little timely service and precaution. Grey reported this changed attitude in despatch 74 of 04 June 1851 to the Colonial Office.² Negotiations to obtain possession of the Company's records were recommended. As a result of correspondence between Domett and Kelham in which the latter signified his willingness to hand over all records relating to land then in his possession, a board consisting of T. H. Fitzgerald, F. D. Bell and T. W. Pinniger was appointed by the government to receive the records. This board reported on 28 June that they had received possession of the records. On the same day Grey appointed F. D. Bell, T. H. Fitzgerald and H. St Hill to investigate and survey the records, and their report, dated 20 August, indicates that the records were in so unsatisfactory a state that they were useless for the purpose of issuing Crown Grants. There was no complete register of land selected by the Company's purchasers, no register of town and country sections showing which had been selected and which not, and no register of actual landowners in the settlement. The settlement plans were torn and dirty, there were 24 books or registers under various names in which various land transactions professed to be traceable, but their confusion was made almost inextricable by the multitude and variety of unreliable references. They stated that before a Commissioner could be appointed under the terms of the New Zealand Company's Land Claimants Ordinance, or before Crown Grants could be issued,

new registers would have to be constructed at great trouble and expense. All this correspondence was forwarded by Grey to the Colonial Office in despatch 108 of 21 August 1851.³

Meanwhile The Colonial Office had been in communication with the head office of the New Zealand Company about the matters contained in Sir George Grey's despatch No.36 of 08 February 1851. Fox had written to the New Zealand Company on 12 June 1851; on his arrival in England justifying his conduct in refusing to permit the local government access to records in his possession except under conditions proposed by himself. He was induced to adopt such a course because of the lack of instructions from the head office, and because he inferred from published correspondence that Lord Grey was disinclined to accept the Company's resignation. This letter was forwarded to the Colonial Office on 26 June 1851, and in the reply dated 12 July, Hawes stated that Lord Grey did not propose to enter upon a consideration of the conduct which Fox had thought his duty to take, although so entirely at variance with the anxiety shown by the Directors to afford His Majesty's Government every facility in disposing of the many and complicated questions which His Majesty's Government had had to decide, but that he wished that all those in New Zealand in charge of New Zealand Company documents concerning land should give to the local government the freest access. Such instructions were sent out to Kelham by Harington in a letter dated 16 July 1851. All this correspondence was forwarded to Sir George Grey in despatch 70 from Earl Grey dated 07 August 1851.⁴

On 07 January 1852 Grey wrote to the Colonial Office (despatch 9)⁵ further complaining about the state of the Company's records in New Zealand, and stating the false and unfair position in which the government was placed in being compelled to administer property of which it had very imperfect knowledge. He stated that he trusted that Earl Grey would request the New Zealand Company to return to New Zealand the documents which Fox had taken home with him.

On 08 January the Colonial Office transmitted to the New Zealand Company Grey's despatch 108 of 21 August 1851 in which he forwarded the adverse report of the board appointed to investigate the New Zealand Company records. This despatch was laid before the Directors and they resolved that it be forwarded to Fox for his comments. These he made in a letter to Harington dated 26 January 1852: the registers had no legal validity and might as well be destroyed as the onus was on the claimants to prove their titles and that all the claimant was required to do was to exhibit his landorder; he was not responsible for the condition of the records relating to original purchases; there was no opportunity for making a register of actual landowners because of transfers made without reference to the Principal Agent; the selection plans were made in 1840 and were in constant use, but particular care was taken of them. In conclusion he stated that the members of the board were unacquainted with the contents of the Company's office, and he repudiated the imputation in Sir George Grey's despatch that he desired to embarrass the government. Fox's letter was then sent to the Colonial Office on 03 Feb 1852, and on 27 March Lord Desart replied stating that Sir John Pakington found it necessary to again refer to the Governor before forming any opinion as to the expense which the New Zealand government might have thrown upon them by the state of the New Zealand Company records, but that he would transmit willingly any records held by the New Zealand Company in England which might supply omissions and clear up inaccuracies in the local records. This correspondence was enclosed in despatch 33 of 20 July 1851 from Pakington to Grey.⁶

On 15 October 1852 in despatch No.68⁷ Pakington replied to Grey's despatch to the Colonial Office dated 07 January 1852. The latter despatch had been forwarded to the New Zealand Company on 18 May with the request that the Directors take immediate measures for obtaining from Fox and forwarding to the Colonial Office all documents brought from New Zealand relating to the estate of the New Zealand Company which had passed to the Crown. These Sir John

Pakington wished to transmit to New Zealand as soon as possible. This letter was sent to Fox for his comments, which were supplied in a letter from him to Harington on 22 May 1852. Fox stated that he brought only such papers as he considered confidential and that he had left in the colony all records necessary for the public service, however, because of the animus exhibited by Sir George Grey, and the use which Grey had made of documents left in New Zealand, he felt he should have brought all the documents to England. The inconvenience to which the Governor so frequently adverted was due to three causes:- Fox's lack of instructions, the imperfect perception which Grey and his advisors had on the nature of the transactions arising out of the arrangements existing between the British government and the New Zealand Company, and the manner in which Grey had met Fox's offer of an accommodation when Fox proposed to hand over documents to him on certain terms in January 1851. This letter was sent to the Colonial Office on 29 May, with a note stating that the box of records which Fox had brought was undisturbed, but that it would be examined and forwarded as soon as possible. Desart in acknowledging this instructed that the box be opened in the presence of Mr Cox, late Government Commissioner, in order to select any which may appear on enquiry to be required for the purposes of the Colonial Office or the New Zealand Government. Copies were taken of others which might be required but of which the custody properly belonged to the Company. Harington replied on 07 August stating that the box had been opened and examined in the presence of Mr Cox on 09 July 1852, and that they were to be left undisturbed until further disposal had been decided on. The Directors suggested that only items 9 to 35 on the list be forwarded, and that the rest (Colonel Wakefield's journal, correspondence with the local Executive Government, the printed return and plan of New Plymouth) remain with the Directors. Harington was instructed by the Colonial Office on 01 September to forward to that department items 9 to 35 on the list to be subsequently forwarded to New Zealand. Harington replied on 10 September transmitting the documents asked for, which are stamped with the Colonial Office stamp 'Sep.11 1852'.

At some date which has not yet been discovered these records were returned to New Zealand, and on 27 October 1853 Domett, as Civil Secretary, wrote to the Commissioner of Crown Lands, Wellington (E. D. Bell) giving to his charge the books and documents returned to New Zealand by order of the Secretary of State for the Colonies. (See list B appended). The greater part of these papers are now in the National Archives having been transferred at various dates from the Lands and Survey Department (the heirs of the Commissioner of Crown Lands). The rest of the archives of the Principal Agent's office appear to have been transferred to the Commissioner of Crown Lands on 28 June 1851 by the board appointed by the local government, these also having been handed over by the Lands and Survey Department to the New Zealand Archives at various times between 1927 and 1947.
