BARING HEAD / ORUA-POUANUI PARK PLACE NAME ORIGINS

This document is about the origin of the place names that are located at Baring Head / Orua-Pouanui Park, Wainuiomata.

Baring Head is named after Francis Baring (1800 - 1868) who was a supporter of the New Zealand Company. He was also a member of parliament in England and a banker.

Orua-Pouanui is named after of the place of the den or retreat of Pouanui. O means of. Rua means place. Pouanui is a name of a person.

The area for the purposes of this document is the western side of the Wainuiomata River to Fitzroy Bay starting from about 1460 Coast Road, Wainuiomata and going south. The Greater Wellington Regional Council owns the park and the area covered is about 295 hectares. They have owned the park since 2011. Construction of the lighthouse complex was started in 1931 and completed in 1935. The lighthouse itself and another area are still in private hands but rest has public access. All tracks were marked out in 2011. It excludes rock names along the foreshore at Baring Head / Orua-Pouanui.

Access to the Baring Head / Orua-Pouanui Park is from:

- Beach Access Carpark at 1540 Coast Road, Wainuiomata.
- Lighthouse Road Carpark at 1460 Coast Road, Wainuiomata.
- Fitzroy Bay.

Lighthouse Complex Track

Track

A tower or other structure containing a beacon light to warn or guide ships at sea. The road to the lighthouse was constructed in 1932.

Pumphouse River Track

Track

Where the water was pumped from the Wainuiomata River up the hill and over to the World War 2 (1939 - 1945) observation post at Mt Para and the houses at the Lighthouse. The pumphouse was built in 1940.

Pylon Track Track

A tall tower-like structure used for carrying electricity cables high above the ground. These were constructed between 1948 to 1950 when the lighthouse was switched from diesel to electricity.



WWII Lookout Trig Track

Track

Where there are remnants of a World War 2 (1939 - 1945) lookout post. This was first originally constructed in 1935 but was upgraded in 1940. It is also known as Mt Para. This is named after the Māori settlement called Parangarahu located in the southern end of Fitzroy Bay that existed until the 1850s.
